## **Bergamo Love Stories**

For Valentine's Day this month, we are highlighting two love stories that began at Bergamo or on the grounds of Mount Saint John.

In the summer of 1987, Tim and Mary Ellen Dillon (pictured right), met at Bergamo during Marianist LIFE (Living in Faith Experience), a program that brings together students and employees from Marianist high

schools across the country. Mary Ellen (then Menke) was a science teacher at Purcell Marian High School in Cincinnati and Tim was a religion teacher at Chaminade Julienne Catholic (CJ) High School.



When Tim first saw Mary Ellen, he thought, "She's cute, but she's probably a nun." Similarly, when the facilitators introduced themselves, Tim was sitting between a pair of Marianist brothers, and Mary Ellen was unsure if Tim was also a brother. Later, after confirming that neither had taken a vow of celibacy, Tim and Mary Ellen acted in a skit and played a couple who dated, married, and honeymooned – Mary Ellen was "Mrs. Whip" and Tim was her husband, "Cool Whip." One Marianist brother remarked, "We never thought the two of you should be together, but you had such chemistry in the skit!"

The skit proved to be prophetic. Tim and Mary Ellen went on long hikes around the Mount St. John property during LIFE week and later enjoyed their first official date at Kings Island. Two years later, they again facilitated Marianist LIFE – this time as a married couple. They continued to help lead the LIFE program each summer until they started a family and had two children, Brendan and Kateri.

Though their children ended LIFE for them, so to speak, they continued to stay involved with Bergamo. Tim started the Kairos retreat program at CJ and thus has led dozens of retreats at Bergamo, while Mary Ellen wrote one of the stations for the trail guide at Mount St. John. Through the years, Tim and Mary Ellen have attended or hosted numerous Bergamo gatherings, including Kateri's baptism.

The couple is also still involved with the Marianists as members of the Micah 6:8 lay Marianist community and through their work at Marianist institutions – Tim still works at CJ and Mary Ellen teaches biology at the University of Dayton. They also passed their love for the Marianists on to their children. Kateri started a lay Marianist community and both children have been employed by Marianist institutions, with Brendan serving at Bergamo as the guest services coordinator. Tim and Mary Ellen hope their journey might one day inspire Brendan to have a love story instead of spending hours creating outstanding content, such as this article, for the Bergamo newsletter.

Since meeting 37 years ago, Tim and Mary Ellen still enjoy taking long hikes and attending retreats together. They have built a wonderful life for themselves and others, and, at the risk of editorializing, they have been wonderful models of the Marianist charism and terrific parents.

"We have a happy life," said Tim.



Another love story is that of Ginny Snead, Bergamo's accounting administrator, who met her husband, Steve (both pictured left), while working in Marianist Hall.

"I was sitting at my desk in Marianist Hall when he walked by my door with Bro. Tom Payne for an interview, and I thought, 'Boy, is he cute!" said Ginny. Luckily for Ginny, Steve was hired to work at Mount St. John and turned out to be a reliable groundskeeper and a real keeper.

Steve started working on the property in the summer of 1989, and he and Ginny had gone on their first date by the fall.


"We would sit together at lunch," said Ginny. "The staff was all excited for us."

Please tell us about yourselves. We have been married for 62 years and are blessed with 3 children, 8 grandchildren, and 2 greatgrandchildren. We met when we were both working at Beerman's department store - Don was a stock boy and I got to boss him around!

Prayer has been central in our marriage and we have been involved in many faith-based opportunities together. Beginning with the Cursillo, the Charismatic movement, the Healing Light community which was housed above the print shop and the many programs offered at Bergamo during the 70's and 80's.

How have you been involved with Bergamo/the Mount Saint John property? We first attended a pre-Cana retreat on the Mount Saint John property in 1962 (before the Bergamo Center was founded). Following the Second Vatican Council and exhortation of Pope St. John XXIII, Bergamo's patron saint, to "Throw open the windows of the church and let the fresh air of the spirit blow through," Bergamo's presence initiated many faith changes and growth for us and many others. We attended our first guitar mass, experienced dialog masses and began to better appreciate the role of the layperson. Bergamo provided the much-needed bridge between pre and post-Vatican II.

Carol: I have also worked in multiple roles at Mount Saint John, including assisting at retreats, working as a receptionist, in the accounting office and managing the St. Mark's Bookshop satellite store when it was in the Queen of Apostles Chapel building.

While working in the bookstore, I came across a book on the Enneagram, which piqued my interest and marked a leap in my faith journey. Since the 2000s, Don and I have become certified Enneagram teachers and offered national Enneagram workshops at Bergamo.

We have also gone through training to become certified spiritual directors and have offered this ministry and met regularly with spiritual directees at Bergamo since 2015.

What is a highlight of your involvement at Bergamo? Carol: As I reflect on the experiences that have endured it would be the love of scriptures that was instilled by Fr. Frank Maloney and the precious gift of contemplation instilled by Bro. Bob Brisky.

We also loved learning from the Marianists and all of the programs that were brought in here over the years.
